- The entire campus is Wi-fi enabled.
- Two large computer-laboratories, equipped with an adequate number of computers cater to the needs of students of all sections.

- Adopting the best practices and highest quality of teaching through continuous innovations in teaching-learning methods and up gradation of infrastructure.
- Nurturing the pride of students in their cultural heritage and linguistic traditions.
- Promoting innate skills of the students, with special encouragement provided to girls by imparting leadership and entrepreneurship skills through exposure to practical situations and co-curricular activities.
- Sharpening of communication skills and strength of personality through workshops and interface with various sections of society as well as industry.
- Encouraging the quest for intellectual excellence of the teachers and igniting the desire for lifelong learning among students through encouragement of research and creativity.
- Building up a constructive co-operation with other institutions in the interests of educational excellence.

6.2 Does the Institution have a Management Information System?

The college has in place a well structured and efficient MIS system. The functional areas where the system is currently operating in the institution includes a comprehensive student database, examination and finance.

• Admissions – An online admissions system that ensures transparency and efficiency in the admission process while simultaneously generating an invaluable information

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database

- Student profiles The MIS system helps generate a comprehensive database on each student right from the time of his/ her admission up to the time of his/her graduation/post-graduation.
- Examination The MIS system generates a comprehensive database on student performance in the University examination. The database aids the internal teaching-learning-evaluation system of each department of the college as it is used as an indicative measure for the departments' strengths, opportunities and areas of improvement.
- Finance & Accounting The financial MIS integrates the financial information of the information aiding in identifying the receivables and defaulters. COSA (Computerization of Salary Account) has been implemented since December 2014.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development:

The college offers undergraduate and post graduate courses under the affiliation of the University of Calcutta. The curriculum is designed by the affiliating University and is made available to the College for implementation. From time to time, the University of Calcutta updates the curriculum keeping in view the changes taking place in the world of education and industry. Some of the college faculties are members of the Board of Studies of different disciplines who contribute to the curriculum designing process of the University. Teachers are familiarized with the changes in curriculum through seminars and workshops organized by the University. Meetings are convened by the respective departments within the college for forwarding suggestions periodically so that the curriculum is modernized at regular intervals, keeping in mind the changing needs of society.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- The institution has set up an up to date infrastructure support in terms of classrooms, laboratories, teaching-learning tools, library, staff rooms, etc. All classrooms are equipped with LCD projection systems, LCD screens, USB ports for laptop connectivity, white boards and air conditioners. The institution also constantly provides additional space for accommodating new subjects.
- For improving academic excellence and generating student interest in future research, the institution has budgetary provision for laboratory and infrastructure upgradation. At the beginning of the session, individual departments list out their equipment and component requirements necessary for updating the science and computer laboratories for

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administrative approval. The approval is readily granted to facilitate and inculcate the practice of undertaking research.

- The institution has two large Computer laboratories with a sufficient number of terminals. The entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled.
- Uninterrupted electricity and water supply, cleanliness and maintenance of campus, CC-TV surveillance, etc are also provided thereby promoting a favourable environment for quality and teaching learning experience, without any disruption.
- The existing central library is a large, fully digitalized, well equipped and well stocked one with competent staff. The library has continued to increase the number of books both text and reference copies; journals, e-journals; newspapers and periodicals; computer terminals with internet access; existence of INFLIBNET facilities; etc. thereby benefitting both students and staff. Apart from this every department has its own library, which is periodically upgraded.
- Mentoring, workshops, seminars, industry/site visits, internship, publication of wall
 magazines, etc. besides ICT enabled teaching, BCC, digitized library with INFLIBNET
 facility, a continuous internal evaluative system of class and home assignments, tutorials
 and class tests, etc. provide academic, personal and psycho-social support to the students.
- Regular departmental meetings, self-evaluation and student feedbacks enable faculty to continuously hone and upgrade their teaching learning faculties.
- Organization of and participation in seminars, workshops, conferences etc. and the enabling environment for personal research work and research projects operated by varied funding agencies, help develop the research potential of the faculty.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Affiliated to the University of Calcutta, the students of the institution are evaluated annually by the University as per its guidelines. Simultaneously, following the University guidelines, an internal bi-annual system of evaluation is also run. This internal examination system is supplemented by regular class tests and student presentations where the students are evaluated on the basis of their written and demonstration skills. At the end of the term remedial classes are scheduled by individual departments as per the requirement of the students. Online Self-Assessment facility is available to students through MCQ.



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6.3.4 Research and Development

A Research Committee consisting of faculty members convene at regular intervals to guide and facilitate the research potentials of the faculty and students. The Committee co-ordinates with the IQAC and the various departments and faculty to:

- Help faculty conduct research work as per UGC prescribed guidelines
- Encourage faculty publications.
- Promote ISSN and ISBN publication by individual departments of the institution.
- Encourage departmental initiatives to organize seminars, workshops, invited lectures, etc. in order to generate student and staff interest in the important and pertinent research topics and/or subjects
- Prepare budget plans for promoting research infrastructure in the institution.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure /instrumentation

Library infrastructure

7. Innovations and Best Practices

- 7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.
 - Introduction of a Masters Degree in English The College got affiliation from the University of Calcutta following an inspection of the facilities and infrastructure. Full-fledged classes began in December 2015.
 - A basic **Fire fighting Training programme** was conducted by the West Bengal Fire & Emergency Services for the support staff of the institution to deal with sudden crises. This ensures the security of the students, staff and the college property.
 - **Recycling of paper** The authorities have adopted a policy of using recycled paper for in-house purposes. This has substantially reduced the purchase & consumption of paper.
 - **Bio-metric attendance** The bio-metric recording of attendance now covers all members of the staff teaching & non-teaching, thereby minimising the errors in manual records.
 - Minimization of use of paper The implementation of the Online Admission System
 has offered great ease, transparency and efficient time management in the entire
 admission procedure. Above all, it is also part of the policy of conservation of natural
 resources.
 - Automation of the college central library The entire library system inclusive of cataloguing is digitized. This helps in the entire process of maintaining checks and balances in the library system and aids the patron in locating the necessary books and journals available at the library. Faculty and students are provided with personal password to browse through and consult the huge stock of e-journals and e-books available on the Cloud campus.
 - **ICT enabled classrooms** Widespread use of ICT has rendered the teaching learning process more interactive. Students are also encouraged to make their own presentations on a given topic from time to time to encourage hidden talents.

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7.2 Provide the Action Taken Report (ATR) based on the plan of action decided upon at the beginning of the year.

ACTION TAKEN REPORT

To achieve the goal of making the campus eco-friendly the institution has incorporated some effective measures on the following criteria:

a) Beautification of Campus:

- The entire building has been repaired and painted afresh.
- Tiles have been replaced in the drive and in the balconies.

b) Energy Conservation:

Almost the entire campus, excluding the open corridors and lawn, is air-conditioned which consumes higher than normal electricity during summer. To compensate for the high energy consumption during working hours:

- Air conditioners remain switched off during non-working hours and winters under strict supervision by three persons on each floor.
- All computers remain centrally disconnected immediately after the class-hours.
- Sufficient number of LED lights has been introduced in all classrooms to minimize the energy bill in the campus.

c) Hazardous waste management:

The departments of Physics (area- 2000 sq.ft, approx.) and Chemistry (area- 1600 sq.ft approx.,) are conscious about the need for proper treatment of their lab-wastes. Both laboratories are spacious, airy and well-ventilated to keep the in-lab environment eco-friendly for the students as well as teachers and lab-workers.

The campus is declared as 'No Plastic Zone' and 'No Tobacco Zone' in order to ensure that the campus environment is free of pollution.

Jute bags are used for gift purpose in various college festivals to avoid plastic and promote this 'golden fibre' of West Bengal.

d) E-waste Management:

The Computer and Electronics laboratories are also well-equipped in terms of e-waste management. E-waste is found to be treated at a regular interval in the following way:

Used monitors, CPUs, etc. from Computer Laboratory are sometimes donated to needy
organisations as a step towards social work by the Institute. E-waste from this laboratory is
also segregated, labelled and disposed of accordingly through specific collectors of Kolkata
Municipal Corporation.



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• The Physics laboratory generates solid e-waste containing diodes, chip, transistors, dry cell etc. which are segregated, collected in separate bags and labelled. Efforts are on to tie up with the Kolkata Municipal Corporation for their disposals.

- Display of posters with environment protection messages throughout the institution

- The unfavourable student Teacher ratio in some departments
- Absenteeism among students
- Lack of outdoor games area, within the premises.
- Need for a hostel to accommodate students from other states.

OPPORTUNITIES:

- **Expansion of College Campus:** The College has acquired new space near its current building. The said building is being modified and renovated to accommodate some sections new sections.
- Leveraging entrepreneurship: The large number of entrepreneurs associated with the college constitute of pool of experts who may provide students with industrial experience. They may be utilized by the Research cum Incubation

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Centre under construction and an Entrepreneurship Development Cell of the college, both of which are in the process.

- The Arts Section has been converted to a co-educational section to enhance inclusiveness.
- Upgrading of newly introduced General courses (Journalism and Mass Communication and Sociology) to Honours courses.
- Introduction of M.A. in English and Honours in Computer Science.

CHALLENGES:

- Our college is an urban college located at the heart of the city causing paucity of adequate open space.
- There is no provision for a hostel to accommodate students from outside the state.
- Many colleges are situated in and around our college offering similar programmes resulting in stiff competition.
